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MEASURELESS AND STRONG

The predecessor to our current hymnal (variously known as The Mennonite Hymnal, the red hymnal, or the brown hymnal, depending on how you see that odd color) was published in 1969, when I was nine years old. It is the hymnal that I remember best from my growing up years, al-though I do remember the embossed title from the prior hymnal that we could shade in on our bulletins during church on Sunday mornings.

The Mennonite Hymnal put all the gospel songs into one section at the back of the book, and that was the section from which the congregation I grew up in sang most often. And in that section of gospel songs there was one that captured my imagination like no other. Actually, it was the third verse of that song that created pictures in my mind and stirred my heart.

Could we with ink the ocean fill And were the skies of parchment made; Were every stalk on earth a quill, And every [one] a scribe by trade; To write the love of God above Would drain the ocean dry; Nor could the scroll contain the whole, Though stretched from sky to sky.

O love of God, how rich and pure! How measureless and strong! It shall forevermore endure The saints' and angels' song.

These images of the immeasurability of God's love have shaped how I understand and experience who God is and what salvation means. It has played a part in shaping my theology. I read the scripture, I read the hymn, and I confess: God is love. God loves me. God loves others. God calls us into relationship through lesus Christ because of love. God asks us to return the love poured out on us, and God asks us to love others as a reflection of what we have ourselves experienced, as imperfect as that reflection may be.

I think I was not the only person who embraced that gospel hymn. It did not appear in our current Hymnal, but it immediately reappeared in the first supplement that was published afterwards. I think I was not the only person who has been captivated by those images of the love of God that reconciles and pardons and redeems and that stretches from sky to sky. I think I am not the only person who relies on that immeasurable love, day to day, year to year, on into eternity.

On the occasion of the celebration of the 130th Anniversary of Women's Groups at First Mennonite Church on June 11, 2017

In 1887, Pastor Abraham Sudermann imagined, "What if the creative ladies at First Mennonite Church here in Newton, Kansas, could raise money for missionaries around the world?"

In response to Pastor Sudermann's idea, six creative ladies imagined, "What if we were to call ourselves the Mission Sewing Society and use our sewing skills to help support these missionaries?"

Upon hearing about this, women from the community imagined, "What if we could take the quilts we have prepared to the gifted quilters at First Mennonite and have them do the quilting for us?"

In 1933, members of the Mission Sewing Society imagined, "What if we could create a Mission Study Circle for the purpose of informing and educating women on the specific needs of these missionaries?"

In addition, these same dedicated ladies imagined, "What if we would invite young girls to assist us by making marketable crafts and older girls to prepare mailings for missionaries seeking support?"

At the same time, the older women imagined, "What if we were to expand our mission by making comforters, layettes and kits to be distributed by the Mennonite Central Committee?"

In the years that followed, persons in the community imagined, "What if, for example, we would have these Mennonite ladies, who are known to be great cooks, prepare and serve lunch for our auction crowds?"

With regard to the ladies, they were having such a good time working together on all their projects that they imagined, "Why don't we call ourselves the Mission Fellowship Circle?" And so they did!

On this day, June 11, 2017, under the capable leadership of Amanda, Kathryn, and Ella, the ladies of First Mennonite are looking forward to the future and imagining, "What if...?"

CAREGIVING CORNER

The last of the 5 Languages of Love is receiving gifts. A gift is a tangible reminder that someone has remembered or thought about you. In order to give a gift, someone has to be thinking of you. A gift is the symbol of someone's thoughtfulness. The importance of the thought is that it is expressed in actually creating a gift and giving it as an expression of your feeling. Gifts are visual symbols of love, care and concern. Receiving these gifts make us feel loved and cared for. By accepting gifts and appreciating them we validate the feelings of the givers.

In a church, there are many ways that we give each other gifts. We have all been recipients of gifts of food, cards and memorials. A fresh baked loaf of bread or a casserole for a family with a new baby or a grieving family are ways that we give and show our love and desire to help in situations where we stand together with each other.

Many of us make gifts of salads or cakes for families after funerals. Eating together is a comforting time of remembering and being together at a time of loss.

At baptisms, we as a church give towels and candles. These tangible gifts are reminders of covenant and promises made. These gifts hold special and sacred memories that we want to honor. Friendship meals are another gift that we give each other. The gift of a meal that you did not cook and the time to sit down to eat with the church family is an opportunity to be present and share conversation with each other. We gift our youth with opportunities such as Mennonite college scholarships, service trips and they gift us with fund raising meals and enthusiastic reports. Sometimes we think that people's acts of service are part of their job title or duty. But think of the happy surprise that it would be for our church staff to receive a tangible symbol of appreciation.

We should be encouraged to act on a nudge—if we feel the urge to give a gift as an expression of love, concern or thankfulness, we will feel loved by the act of giving as well as in the receiving.

WELCOMING PLACE: TIPS FOR WELCOMING NEWCOMERS

- Offer a genuine welcome to everyone---long-time members, newer members and visitors.
- True hospitability means putting visitors first when making choices in the use of time. Visitors need more attention than regulars.
- Rather than immediately asking if someone is new, consider a simple introduction like: "Hi, I'm not sure we've met. My name is _____."
- Families come in many forms, including single parent, same gender, multi-generational, and others. **Don't make assumptions about relationships**. Ask open-ended questions that encourage the visitor to speak about him or herself, e.g. "Are you new to town?" or "How did you hear about us?" Try to avoid questions like "Are you married?" or "Where is your husband today?"
- If possible, and if the visitor is interested, introduce the visitor to one of the pastors after the service.

First Mennonite Church is already a very friendly and welcoming place! We've heard this time and time again from countless visitors. At the same time, the Outreach Commission believes that there is always room to grow and push ourselves to more completely show God's love to everyone.

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Church Board Report

The Board met on August 2, 2017. Ryan Koehn opened by leading the board in prayer.

The meeting was dedicated to discussing items related to the GRACE report.

Angela Black of the Nurture Commission reviewed suggested updates to the Safe Sanctuaries policy. Board members discussed the document and made suggestions for additional changes. The Board spent a significant amount of time in this process with many ideas and suggestions shared. More revisions will be made to the document.

The Nurture Commission requested the Church Board to make an announcement on Sunday, August 6, to encourage all adults to attend the Safe Sanctuaries training on August 13 and 20. The Board approved by consensus.

Ryan Koehn reported on the costs from the GRACE assessment. The assessment took more time than was originally anticipated due to the good survey response and requests for interviews. Ryan Koehn and Ron Ratzlaff will have further discussion with GRACE on their costs. Cindy Combs submitted her resignation from the Nurture Commission.

The Board approved Linda Shelly as an FMC delegate to the Western District Conference Annual Assembly.

The Board also met on August 10, 2017. Ron Ratzlaff led the board in devotions and prayer.

The Board had a round-table discussion about what each member is hearing from the congregation after receiving the GRACE report. Each Board member also discussed their own feelings about the report. It was a good, healthy discussion. The Board shared a range of thoughts and feelings which seemed to be a good representation of what the congregation is thinking and feeling.

The Board also planned three congregational meetings to further process the GRACE report and to discern our path forward.

Wednesday, August 23 (7:00 PM) – Listening and Responding This will be a time for the congregation to have round-table discussions. The purpose will be to listen to each other. Several questions will be provided to aid the table discussions.

Sunday, September 10 (12:30 PM) – Learning from the perspective of a survivor

We may have an outside speaker for a portion of the meeting. We will invite survivors in our congregation to share what they feel is important for FMC to learn from their experience.

Sunday, September 24 (6:00 PM) – Processing the GRACE Recommendations

We will spend time as a congregation reviewing and processing the recommendations from the GRACE report.

Funds are still needed to complete our obligation to GRACE. We need to raise an additional \$2,500. Thank you for the support you've already given.

She played piano in church and helped serve lunch at many funerals. She valued the relationship with her Sunday school class members. She had many friends whom she kept in touch with through visits and letters. She was known for her remarkable memory of names and people.

She was also known for her service to others. Among her activities

were volunteering at the Et Cetera Shop, serving juice at the Bethel Home for the Aged on Fridays, and participating in the Bethel-Kidron Auxiliary. She enjoyed having lunch with friends and attending Life Enrichment at Bethel College. Relationships were very important to Mildred.
