World Communion and Us

OUR VISION: Together in Christ: rooted deeply, reaching widely, loving well

OUR MISSION: With Jesus as our center, we are called to be:

- Faith-Focused—Growing spiritually, anchored in God's love and faithfulness.
- Mission-Minded—Sharing hope and grace through Spirit-inspired, passiondriven faith in action.
- Community-Connected— Worshiping together, welcoming, accepting, encouraging, and inviting all to follow Christ.

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On October I (which is, of course, also the first Sunday of October), we will be celebrating World Communion Sunday. On that day, we will remember that we are linked to other Christians around this globe that we live on by virtue of our common faith in Jesus Christ. We will also remember, as we do every time we take communion together, that we are joined with each other in our journey of faith. We will remember that the Church is bigger and beyond this particular time and this particular place.

The idea of a "world communion" observance began in 1933 by Hugh Thompson Kerr, a Presbyterian pastor of the Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA. Kerr was serving as moderator of the General Assembly of his denomination at that time, and World Communion Sunday was an "attempt to bring churches together in a service of Christian unity—in which everyone might receive both inspiration and information, and above all, to know how important the Church of Jesus Christ is and how each congregation is interconnected one with another." (1)

The idea did not take off very quickly. It was not until World War 2 began that the concept took hold because, said Kerr's son, "we were trying to hold the world together. World Communion symbolized the effort to hold things together, in a spiritual sense. It emphasized that we are one in the Spirit and the Gospel of Jesus." Today World Communion Sunday is celebrated around the globe; it reminds us Christians who live in an increasinglyfractured world that we are citizens of a different kingdom.

What is true in our congregation is that we are going through a challenging time in our life together. There are some stress fractures showing up. In light of that fact, I've been asked (and have asked myself) how we can celebrate

communion with integrity.

After a number of conversations, including among the members of the Caregiving and Membership Commission who serve as our deacons, here is our conclusion: How can we not take communion? How can we not remember how deeply each of us is in need of God's grace through Jesus Christ?

One of the threads of these conversations included the importance of confession, of taking time to come before God honestly in revealing our brokenness, our need, our sin. We prepare to come to the communion table via confession. It is during that time that we understand our hunger and our thirst for the bread and

Update From Sharon Harder

Jesus Our best Friend-

Greetings from South Texas! We are looking forward to cooler weather here on the Mexican border. Temperatures are still in the upper 90's with a triple-digit heat index but it is nice to be outside in the mornings or late evenings now. Early mornings are the best moments of my day. That's because that is when I set aside a time to meet with my best Friend. He's always there when I go and His mood never changes. He consistently needs to straighten something out in my life and I am so glad He knows just how to do that. Everything is under His control (even if or when I don't believe it), and He is the One who speaks to me any time I can connect to Him. I am very aware that the days I do not have that communion, the hours in the office seem very empty.

There are 138 students at the Rio Grande Bible College this semester from about 16 countries in South America. I am able to receive several students each semester at Radio Esperanza on the RGBC campus where I have a counseling office. One girl, now an alumnus, came with so much emotional pain. She was a single mother whose teenage son was living a life estranged from the Lord. She had a lot of remorse for her past life but after making a decision to believe in Jesus' death on the cross for forgiveness of sin she began to serve in her church in southern Mexico. The pastor there encouraged her to get Bible training and that church supported her faithfully during four years of a Bachelor of Arts program here at the RGB College.

Even though she was a believer and studying the Word of God every day, she couldn't rid herself of the regrets, negative thoughts and anger stemming from her youth. As she shared her story we discovered that her dad was seldom home and mom always had to work. She never received affection or attention as a child. Added to the pain of not being cared for there were large responsibilities placed on her and criticism by family members. At the age of 10 she had to cook, clean and take care of her younger siblings. The emotional needs that weren't met as a child plus feeling overwhelmed with responsibilities she couldn't emotionally handle at such a young age caused her to enter into moral failure with the father of her

son. When she came to my office she was growing spiritually but still carrying the emotional pain of her youth. As we went to God in prayer, we made sure that the moral failure was totally forgiven, with no remaining guilt. Then we took each area of emotional pain identified to the Lord. She asked: "Jesus, do you care that I felt so alone and ignored as a child? Were You there? Jesus, am I important to You? Do You think I'm special? Jesus, would You be my friend? Every time I feel lonely or overwhelmed because of too much stress/ responsibilities now, what would You want me to think instead of feeling down with all those memories?" Jesus gave her a new song to sing: "What a friend we have in Jesus, all our sins and griefs to bare. What a privilege to carry everything to God in prayer. Are we weak and heavy laden, cumbered with a load of care; Precious Savior, still our Refuge! Take it to the Lord in prayer!"

"One pencil, two pencils, three pencils, four." This story was repeated 189 times as the children and the church collected 756 pencils as part of the MCC School kit children's offering project. The entire church banded together to collect spiral notebooks- 224 to be exact. 79 boxes of colored pencils, 104 rulers and 112 erasers.

This intergenerational project included multiple seamstresses who sewed 104 bags for the kits, persons who donated school supplies and adults who gave money to the FMC-Mart where the school supplies were sold on Sunday morning, so that ALL

children could buy school supplies. The joy on the faces of the children was unmistakable. The children carried their purchases to their Sunday School rooms, and added the items to the growing piles in their classrooms. At the Children's Day Celebration, the children were intent on getting all of the bags assembled before they went out to play at all of the options available outside.

The financial gift to MCC was \$330.25 which included two generous donations of cash. The value of the 56 school kits (@ \$4.00 per kit) was \$224.00 and the individual school kit items equaled

\$309.50. The total value of this project was \$863.75 in cash and items in kind.

Who can say that "one pencil, two pencils, three pencils, four" don't add up to a sizeable contribution to MCC! Thank you First Mennonite Church for your generous gift to MCC!

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Church Board Report

The board met on September 14, 2017. Nancy opened with devotions and prayer.

The board approved a taskforce to be formed and report to the Caregiving and Membership Commission. This taskforce will be charged with developing a policy for the care of survivors of sexual abuse and sexual offenders. The goal is to have the policy ready to present to the congregation at the congregational meeting in April of 2018.

The board spent time reviewing the past two meetings that were focused on the GRACE report. We are very thankful for the survivors who were willing to share their stories with the congregation. Hearing the stories, and lessons that FMC can learn from them, was very important as we learn to become a survivor focused church. The board made plans for the third congregational meeting. This was held on September 24, 6:00 PM, in the Fellowship Hall. This meeting focused on processing the GRACE recommendations.

The board spent time reflecting on the recommendations to help prepare ourselves for the September 24 meeting. No decisions will be made on the recommendations until after the congregational meeting. A special board meeting was scheduled for October 26. The focus of this meeting will be to make decisions about the GRACE recommendations. The board approved the following projects to be funded from the Mildred Unruh Estate: \$9K—Complete the Window Fund; \$15K—Replace the South and West doors; \$20K—Dream Fund.

The Board read the FMC vision prayer as a closing.

the cup, for the salvation and healing that they represent.

Another thread was recognizing that communion reminds us of what we hope for. It is aspirational rather than descriptive. In other words, communion calls us toward what God desires of us, to be joined together in Jesus Christ so that we might become a holy (and whole) dwelling place. We know we're not all the way there, but communion renews our hope. Finally, and probably most important, communion reminds us that our unity must be located in Jesus Christ who lived, who died, and who was raised again. It is by grace and through the faithfulness of lesus that we become beloved children of God and members of the Body of Christ. We need that grace and so does everyone else, whether or not we're in agreement. That is the truth on which we rely and by which we become members of one another.

Let us give thanks to the One who loves, who forgives, who calls, who nourishes us in our faith and life.

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Voluntgering—Faith Enhancement



Welcome to Et Cetera! It is a joy greeting the group of people entering the front door of our shop promptly at

9:30 AM each Friday morning when I regularly volunteer. They eagerly select the items they have been "window shopping" while waiting for the doors to open.

It is the random acts of kindness that continues to build my faith in Christ's work among us. The adage of "paying it forward" is alive and thriving at our store! Examples include: customers who may be just a few cents short to pay for their purchases and the person behind them in the checkout line provides the necessary change; I recall another instance where two young sisters donated \$10.50 as a result of a personal fundraiser for the MCC donation box by putting on a show for their neighborhood, and the sales and dobusiness man within our community standing by the clerk's station and paying for customers' tally of purchases during the Christmas season. These are just a few examples of Christian love and sharing.

For those unaware of the processing of donations I would

like to share a tidbit about Carol Goering, a member of FMC, who prepared a progress chart on clothing donated to the Et Cetera Shop. Primary use: (1) sold, or (2) recycled to MCC Center in North Newton where clothing is baled, sold, and shipped to third parties within the U.S. and Canada; (3) discarded if moldy, smells offensive or (4) up-cycled which is torn or cut into strips, sewn together, wound onto shuttles and woven into rugs, placemats, hot pads or other creative items on the large looms at the front of the store then sold.

It takes many volunteers working together to accomplish the generous contributions both to MCC and the local community. The Et Cetera Shop is an anchor to our downtown merchants thanks to our local residents and the many out of town visitors that purposely come to Newton to shop.

In 2016 our local store gave

over \$239.000 to MCC from nation boxes, \$26,000 in local giving in addition to over \$25,000 in gifts in kind which included bicycles given to residents of New Hope

Shelter for transportation, store vouchers to local service organizations for persons in need and recycled clothing, purses, belts and shoes from our store to MCC-Central States.

Volunteering is more than donating time; it is the essence of living!
