REFLECTIONS ON CELEBRATIONS BY DEWAYNE PAULS



Here are some of my personal reflections on

what FMC celebrations have done for me and hopefully for the church as well. Some of our church celebrations were at times when our church was going through difficult times and we needed reminding of God's many blessings. Many of the celebrations were closed with a communion service. The celebrations could not have been accomplished without the help of many of you. It is amazing how many people have been a part of the hours of planning it takes to have a celebration.



Our first celebration was in 1990

with the theme of Celebrate God's Blessings. We learned to know each other by bringing tools of our trade to use as centerpieces. The theme for the Saturday evening meal which was served by the Faith Mennonite Church was

"Many Gifts—Same Spirit." Sunday morning's theme was "God's People are our People" and the evening theme was "We are God's Family." The Sunday evening meal was served by Hope Mennonite Church.



In 1991 the celebration was a reunion of the New Directions which had been a singing group directed first by Vyron Schmidt and later by Roger Smith, both of who had been youth directors of FMC.

The Hobby Fair was in 1992 during the time we were working with outreach through the LIFE (Living in Faithful Evangelism) program. Many people filled the basement rooms with their hobbies.

"Praise Events" was held in 1993 with a large tent in the east parking lot of the church. The tent was filled to overflowing.



Verney Unruh retired in 1998. The church celebrated his retirement.

In 2000 we celebrated with "Blessing and Beginnings."



Fun Fest was held in 2002. The community was invited to share in this event with inflatable rides and games set up in the west parking lot. Over 900 persons attended the event on Saturday despite the 100 degree temperature. Numerous thank you cards were received from community persons attending.



The 125th anniversary of the church was celebrated in 2003. A bus ride with narration was provided to various historical areas around Newton that had been instrumental in starting FMC. Historical skits were given. The worship service gave praise to God for all the blessings given to the church.

In 2016 and 2017 several mini-celebrations were held. The first was celebrating the completion of the Nebraska house. The evening celebration was held at Son Wray Ranch. Another celebration was in the form of a service project to the Wichita Food

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL 2018

Together In Christ

Vacation Bible School at First Mennonite Church is always a whirlwind of activity, and this year was no exception!



On Friday evening the children, their families, friends, and church members enjoyed hot dogs, hamburgers, watermelon and fellowship in the church parking lot. Shortly after the meal was finished, many chose to head to the city pool for an evening of free swimming. It was a wonderful way to cool off on a hot summer day.

On Saturday the children were led through a day of Bible stories, crafts, and activities centered on the theme, “Together in Christ,” the key message of our church logo. Singing songs related to the theme started the day off right, as well as memory work and an opportunity to learn about how the logo was created. The children learned that perseverance is an important attribute; much trial and error went into completing a logo that represented our church well. Each participant tie-dyed a white t-shirt which had the church logo printed on the front.



The first group of stations addressed the topic of being “rooted deeply” in Christ. The Parable of the Seed and the Sower was told using examples of the various soils in clay pots. The children planted flowers to beautify the church as well as their own seeds. They created their own “dirt cup” snacks complete with crushed cookies and pudding dirt and gummy worms.



Next, the children learned about various examples of what it means to “love well.” The poor traveling victim in the Good Samaritan story visited VBS and shared how blessed he was when someone finally stopped to help him. They were encouraged to think about ways to show love to those around them. The modern-day story, *Enemy Pie*, was also read and the children wrote thank-you notes to some of the ladies from Casa Batania who were kind enough to prepare and serve a delicious lunch.

“Reaching widely” is also a part of living together in Christ. The

VBS kids discussed what that would look like in their schools, neighborhoods, state, country and the world. They created welcome hats after hearing the story, *Mr. Brown’s Fantastic Hat*, and put together MCC Hygiene Kits.

As if the day wasn’t eventful enough, it ended with time for ice pops, jumping in the bounce house and water games on the front lawn. In addition to the many activities taking place at VBS, the children created original leaves to be included on a banner representing the logo. The banner will be shared with the congregation later this summer.

Once again, we acknowledge it would not have been possible without those who volunteered to help out with VBS. Thanks is extended to those who donated items, planned lessons and activities, helped supervise children, prepared and served the Friday evening cook-out and Saturday lunch, and who upheld Vacation Bible School in prayer.





Damascus?...Hebron?...plus you pass by Bethlehem Lane and that's all on Mars Hill (neighborhood). No Kidding!!! No, it is not Christian or "Over 55" housing. With those names I'll have to be spiritual!!

My brother-in-law built this rental home in the early 1990's. I am filled with gratitude at how God has provided and continues to do so. The help I have received in different ways during this transition is nearly overwhelming.

These weeks are busy: cleaning, lots of yard work, house repairs, painting, getting to know the area through furniture shopping and visiting area churches, time with three different visitors, and even get-

ting out in the abundant woods in this area.

Future ministry is still a question. God has reminded me several times that I need to keep my mind off my own inadequacies, that it will be His leading and only His power and presence that can accomplish it.

Thanks for your prayers for me during this time.

Outreach: Showing God's Love to People Outside Our Church Walls



Did you know that FMC has helped to set up 3 apartments for refugees arriving in Wichita this year?

As a result of connections that were made after FMC's Adult Sunday School class on Issues of Immigration in the US in January 2017, we were asked by St. Francis Migration Ministries to set up two apartments for refugees arriving from Democratic Republic of the Congo on the evening of January 23, 2018. One apartment was to be set up for a family of 3, and the other apartment was to be set up for a single man. Thirteen individuals from our congregation (in an informal group called the Refugee Interest Group) met up in Wichita and moved couches, dressers and various household items. We arranged rooms, made beds, washed all the newly donated dishes, set up the kitchen and even got a crock pot going. (The family of three was arriving that very night!)



Typically, the Migration Ministry in Wichita is only given a

few days' notice before a family arrives. They rely on volunteers like us to come with only a few days' notice to set up. It took us almost 4 hours, but was a thrilling experience. Afterwards, several of us had the amazing and heart-warming opportunity to greet the family at the airport. It was an experience we'll never forget!

On June 6, 2018 we were once again asked to help set up an apartment for a refugee who would be arriving in Wichita only days later. Once again, it was a young man from the Congo (age 22). Can you imagine moving to a completely new place, new culture at the age of 22? Never mind the trauma he's most certainly already endured in his homeland. Luckily, the apartment complex we moved him into was the same one with the family of 3 in January. And we were told that there are at least 10 other families in this large complex that arrived



here from the Congo as refugees within the last year. So there will be a community for him of people who can wholeheartedly relate. A Congolese family next door already offered to make him his first meal on the evening that he was to arrive.

We loaded up a couple of trucks with furniture from St. Matthews' Episcopal Church, picked up totes of toiletries and household staples like toilet paper, hand towels, clean-



ers, dish soap, and toothbrushes from St. Francis Migration Ministries head office, and moved the items up 3 flights of stairs to the apartment (with help from the neighbors), set it all up and made it feel welcoming for the following hour or two. It was challenging, exciting, bonding and outreaching. Since the SS class on Immigration



and our first apartment set-up, we have had several people from our congregation contact St. Francis Migration Ministries to donate household items and lightly-used furniture. Thank you! Please let any member of the Outreach Commission know if you are ever interested in helping with an apartment set-up or donating an item. You can also email kendra.alison606@gmail.com if you have lightly-used furniture that you would like to donate.

Thank you to all of you who encourage, pray, help, donate and show God's love to immigrants and refugees in our wider community!


